Rolison, Valdés Smith campaign to work in Albany

For NYS Senate District 39, the race is between incumbent Rob Rolison and the current Minority Leader of the Dutchess County Legislature Yvette Valdés Smith. Rolison is running on the Republican and Conservative lines. Valdés Smith is running on the Democratic and Working Families lines. District 39 covers the cities of Beacon and Poughkeepsie and the towns of Beekman, East Fishkill, Fishkill, Lagrange, Pawling, Poughkeepsie, Union Vale, and Wappinger.

The following questions were sent to the candidates and their responses follow. The incumbent's responses are first.

Rob Rolison

What are your proudest accomplishments from your current term?

I am grateful every day for the opportunity to represent the people of our district. We've handled more than 1,100 constituent cases since 2023 resulting in lower bills, expanded benefits, better treatment for people like our seniors and veterans, and more.

Our Town of Poughkeepsie District Office has launched mobile office events in communities across the district as well, bringing our talented and hardworking staff directly to you.

DUTCHESSE COUNTY COMPTROLLER

Incumbent Pulver faces Aymar-Blair

In the race for Dutchess County Comptroller, incumbent Republican Gregg Pulver is facing the challenge of Democrat Dan Aymar-Blair.

Pulver, a former Dutchess County Legislator, served five terms and served as Chairman of the Legislature for six years. He was appointed to the role of Dutchess County Comptroller beginning Dec. 31, 2023 by County Executive William F.X. O'Neil after Comptroller Robin Lois resigned to take the position of Deputy Comptroller for New York State.

Aymar-Blair states that he has 20 years of experience managing multi-million dollar budgets and has transitioned to government finance and at NYC Public Schools.

We asked two questions of each candidate and will give the answers from Pulver, the incumbent, first.

1. Please list your accomplishments as comptroller during the recent term.

As Dutchess County Comptroller, I

with the rising cost of living, Dutchess residents need proven leadership instead of political activism. I bring an independent attitude every day to this office to decrease county waste and ensure our tax dollars are working for everyone.

A few highlights are below:

- Launched a community initiative "Don't Get Burned by Fraud" to address and increase awareness of potential scams and fraud, especially amongst our most vulnerable seniors.

- Audited and uncovered \$825,000 in improper billings by a county contractor, and allocated it toward Mental Health Services of Northern Dutchess to help residents looking for a way forward.

Amber Grant**What are your proudest accomplishments from the current term?**

This is my third term on city council and I am proud of the overall direction the city is moving in. Specific to my previous experience, I'm most proud of our municipal composting program and its continued success in Beacon. My current term started in Jan '24, and I am thrilled to rejoin the council. I was part of the Visitation Data Committee for the Fjord Trail, which was a great opportunity to dig deep into those plans. What goals do you have for the next term?

Assemblyman Jonathan Jacobson, a Democrat who currently represents District 104, is seeking reelection. Jacobson is running unopposed. He is on the Democratic and Working Families lines.

The 104th Assembly District covers the cities of Beacon and Poughkeepsie, plus sections of Ulster and Orange counties.

Jacobson's responses are below:

What are your proudest accomplishments from the current term?

Over the past two years, I've been busy focusing on issues that affect every resident: Central Hudson, schools, and election integrity.

Central Hudson. I was proud of my quick action dealing with the utility's billing fiasco. This includes two bills I passed in the Legislature: one, already signed into law, restricts utilities from billing more than three months after the billing period and requires them to provide usage records for the previous 13 months; and the second, which is awaiting the Governor's signature, limits estimated billing.


Education. My focus on education included hosting a forum with school superintendents to discuss the best way to fund our schools going forward. I also sponsored a bill requiring high school seniors to complete the FAFSA in order to qualify for college scholarships and grants. This bill passed as part of the State budget.

Election Integrity. I've continued my work to ensure free and fair elections for all New Yorkers with legislation to limit conflicts of interest at Boards of Elections.

Bringing money back to the district. I have brought an additional millions of dollars for our municipalities and nonprofits.

What goals do you have for the new term?

Utility rates. I am submitting legislation to

change how utility rates are calculated, to keep Central Hudson's neverending requests for rate increases under control.

Gun violence. I've written a bill that requires gun buyback programs to destroy all parts of a gun so they don't end up in new gun kits and back on the streets.

Infrastructure. I have a bill to study the structural integrity of bridges in the State to make sure that they can withstand a collision with large ships.

School funding. I will fight to make sure that there are no cuts to Foundation Aid and that each school district gets its fair share.

Bringing money back to the district. I will continue to secure extra funding for our municipalities and nonprofits.

There's been a lot of progress and there's still more to do. I look forward to continuing to bring effective representation to my entire Assembly district.

As Ranking Member on the Senate's Children and Families Committee, along with my 26 years of experience serving our community in law enforcement, I was honored and privileged to prime-cosponsor and then help pass Melanie's Law in the state legislature.

This bill finally closes a deadly loophole in New York's criminal law and empowers survivors by removing hurdles to access orders of protection. The legislation is named for Melanie Chianese, a Dutchess County woman who was murdered by her mother's ex-boyfriend. As an adult, she was ineligible for court-ordered protection. Melanie's mother Cheryl has displayed incredible strength and poise in the wake of this tragedy, and I am proud to call her a friend whom I admire greatly.

Other accomplishments include making essential medications like insulin more affordable and allowing for safe, lower-cost imports, so that life-sustaining medications remain available for our seniors and working families.

Leaders lead by listening, and I have responded to local concerns by acting as your voice in Albany and consistently taking a bipartisan approach to finding common-sense solutions to issues like affordability, housing, and public safety.

What goals do you have if you win a new term?

If re-elected, my priorities for a second term include building on the accomplishments we've already achieved and addressing Albany's counterproductive one-party rule and business-as-usual culture of complacency when it comes to some of the most pressing issues affecting our state.

For example, we must continue to reduce the cost of living statewide, particularly in the Hudson Valley. To do this I'm calling on the Senate to pass my common-sense legislation on housing, childcare, and energy prices, starting in January. I'm willing to work with members of both parties to get things done.

Next, bail and discovery reform need to be revisited. The disastrous changes to the rule of law right before the Covid-19 pandemic spiked crime and made residents less safe.

I'm committed to supporting better pay for our caring professions, too. We will all get old, sick or have an accident one day which could leave us in need of home care or similar services.

I will also renew my call for fair state highway and surface-transportation funding. Our region has the most lane miles and bridges of any DOT region in the state yet only receives on average the

third-highest amount of funding. Our horrendous road conditions in summer 2024 were a testament to the indifference and incompetence encouraged by one-party rule in Albany. This needs to change.

Lastly, I will push for passage of my Fentanyl Occupational Exposure Reduction Act in order to protect first responders who may encounter this deadly drug while keeping our communities safe.

Yvette Valdés Smith**What qualifications would you bring to the role of Senator for District 39?**

As the current Minority Leader of the Dutchess County Legislature, I have put forward legislation to reduce county sales tax and cut property taxes. I've also introduced and backed proposals to improve public safety, protect our environment, and improve quality of life for county residents.

As Senator, I will also draw on my experience as a former public school teacher to advocate for our schools and our children. My two sons are enrolled in our public schools, and I'm deeply committed to ensuring our kids have the resources they need in the classroom to

- Audited the SPCA highlighting the need for improvements to the quality of life provided to our furry friends. Our pets should receive the highest quality of care.

2. What do you see as the main issues regarding this role and what would you like to accomplish if elected?

As Comptroller, I made it a priority to reduce county government waste and ensure our taxpayer dollars are being put toward real services for Dutchess residents. With our wallets being stretched right now, we need responsible fiscal oversight of our taxpayer dollars instead of political activism. I bring that approach to the Comptroller's office every day.

If I'm fortunate to continue serving Dutchess County as Comptroller, I would push for more community initiatives to engage residents on financial literacy, continued fraud and scam prevention, and help our non-profits reach more county residents. We have hard decisions ahead with our upcoming county budgets - I want to ensure that our taxpayers aren't taken advantage of in that process.

My vision for the Dutchess County Comptroller's office is twofold: To be a

true watchdog of taxpayer dollars to uncover and reduce waste, and further develop our outreach to Dutchess.

Dan Aymar-Blair

1. What are your qualifications for the position of County Comptroller?

I've spent my entire career in finance and operations and have 20 years of experience managing multi-million dollar budgets. I started my career at Goldman Sachs and Morgan Stanley, but I quickly realized that profit wasn't my motivator - I was drawn to public service. That's why I transitioned to government finance, and at NYC Public Schools, I've managed a budget as big as Dutchess County's, enforced compliance and rooted out inefficiency.

I'm deeply committed to public service and am serving my third term on the Beacon City Council. I've fought to ensure that the budget truly works for the people: sidewalks, bike lanes, park improvements, and more.

As Dutchess County Comptroller, I'll bring this experience to improve financial oversight and increase accountability.

I also have the independence to do the job right. The County Comptroller is

elected directly by the people for a reason. I'll review the county's finances with a clear focus on what's best for Dutchess-free from competing interests.

2. What do you see as the main issues in this role and what do you hope to accomplish if elected?

The County Comptroller is an oversight position, not a policy-making one. The Comptroller's primary role is to provide oversight and accountability, ensuring that taxpayer dollars are spent efficiently and effectively. The Comptroller is a watch dog. I take that responsibility seriously and will increase audits and strengthen financial oversight. The first issue is how hard the Comptroller works for the people.

Another critical issue is that Dutchess

County has seen projects run over budget, costing taxpayers more than anticipated. We need independent financial oversight to ensure taxpayer money is spent wisely and that county's finances are working for the people.

Transparency is also a key issue. With fewer local news outlets keeping residents informed, the Comptroller must take a more active role to educate the public about the government's spending priorities. You deserve to know how your hard-earned taxpayer dollars are being spent. I will bring my findings directly to taxpayers, touring the county and being available at community events.

With costs so high these days, I want to ensure that property taxes and sales taxes are being spent wisely and that there are proper checks and balances in place.

Kirk Imperati, and DA Anthony Parisi, I've secured millions of dollars to bolster public safety across the county, including hiring more law enforcement officers, creating a state-of-the-art Analysis and Real Time Crime Intelligence Center, and cracking down on hate crimes. I've also partnered with Poughkeepsie Mayor Yvonne Flowers to remove lead pipes from our community, increase access to after-school programs, and invest in the Dutchess YOU.

Those big county-wide projects are always very exciting, but often it is the town-specific ones that are the most rewarding. Working with Hyde Park Supervisor Al Torreggiani to bolster road safety and with Arlington Fire District Chief Steenbergh to renovate their Rochdale firehouse might not make the front page of the papers, but it makes a huge difference for our entire Dutchess community.

2. What goals do you have if you win a new term?

Affordability absolutely comes first. All across the Hudson Valley, families are sitting around their kitchen tables staring at a growing stack of bills - housing, childcare, groceries, utilities, gas - costs keep rising while wages and income have stayed stagnant. My top priority is lowering the cost of living to relieve that economic pressure.

That starts with housing costs. I recently introduced a bold agenda to attack every angle of the housing affordability emergency. I won't go too far into the nitty gritty details, but it's 11 pieces of common-sense legislation to lower rents

and mortgage rates, crack down on the Wall Street firms jacking up housing costs, and cut through red tape to let our towns and cities build in a way that makes sense for them. Passing this into law is a huge goal for the next Congress.

I only have so much space here, but I'll run through a few other priorities, including:

- Lowering taxes, including by removing the SALT Cap and ending the ridiculous double taxation.

- Passing my bipartisan bill with Congressman Molinaro, the Lower Grocery Prices Act, to keep inflation in check and go after price gouging.

- Holding big pharma accountable and lowering prescription drug costs with my "Stopping Pharmas Ripoffs" Act.

As County Executive, I cut the gas tax in half and implemented the largest property tax cut in 40 years. I promise I will continue to do everything I can to bring costs down.

Alison Esposito

1. What are your qualifications for this position?

I'm not a career politician; I'm a cop. With 25 years in the NYPD, I've been on the front lines defending and protecting those who couldn't protect themselves. Following in the footsteps of my father, NYPD Chief Michael Esposito, I rose to the rank of Deputy Inspector and Commanding Officer of the 70th Precinct.

In 2022, I had the honor of running for Lt. Governor alongside Congressman Lee Zeldin. Our campaign took us across the state, where we listened to New Yorkers

on the issues that matter most to them - crime, the border, inflation, taxes, regulations and more. While our campaign came up just short, my commitment to serving the people of this great state remains unwavering.

The Hudson Valley is my home. I was born in Highland Mills and built my home in Goshen almost 20 years ago. Now, I'm running to represent New York's 18th Congressional District in Congress, with a mission to return power to the people and restore common sense in Washington, D.C.

2. What do you see as the main issues in this race and what do you plan to accomplish if you are elected?

Although issues vary from voter to voter, I consistently hear an outcry to make life more affordable, secure our border and get tough on crime. As I travel across the district, I hear from so many residents who are concerned about the unbearably high cost of living, increasing taxes, and regulations. I'm

committed to voting to cut reckless inflationary spending and repeal the SALT cap, which is essentially double taxation for New Yorkers. New Yorkers are overtaxed and overregulated, and we must put a stop to it.

Just yesterday, I spoke with a Walden resident who tragically lost her daughter to fentanyl - likely trafficked across our porous southern border. I support legal, lawful immigration, but the migrant crisis plaguing New York is simply unsustainable. I will always vote to secure our border, and I am proud to be endorsed by the National Customs and Border Patrol Union because they know I will always have their back.

Hudson Valley residents are concerned about rising violent crime and the impact it is having on public safety. As a 25-year veteran of the NYPD, I will always defend, not defund, our police and stand with law enforcement as they work to keep our communities safe.

Prop 1: reminder of George Orwell's 'Animal Farm'

To the Editor:

In George Orwell's classic novella "Animal Farm," the pigs who took over the farm declared that "All animals are equal, but some animals are more equal than others." I am reminded of this when looking at Proposal 1 on our ballot, the so-called "Equal Protection of Law Amendment."

The U.S. Constitution's 14th Amendment already guarantees equal protection of law, so what can this proposed amendment do except to list what groups and classes of people will be "more equally" protected? When progressives talk of "equality" and "equity," you can count on it being about taking something from one individual or group and giving it to another individual or group. This proposal is no exception. It will take away any protection a future legislature might bestow on unborn children (at any stage of development up to and including the moment of birth), as well as protection for conscientious physicians who refuse to take unborn life, in favor of unfettered protection of women seeking to kill their unborn children, regardless of the reasons. It will take away protection of female athletes from males competing in their sports in favor of males who claim to "identify" as female. It will also take away privacy protection from females in their rest rooms and locker rooms to protect the delusions of "gender-confused" males.

If those are results you believe will benefit future generations in New York, then by all means, vote "Yes" on the proposal. But if not, or you think you don't know enough about it to have an opinion, you need to vote "No" or read up on it so you can form an opinion. Remember, if you don't turn the ballot over and check "Yes" or "No," you're essentially casting half of a vote for "Yes."

People putting proposals on ballots have an obligation to educate the electorate on what they will and will not do. These people have not done that and seem to think that putting "Equal Protection" in the title is enough to get people to vote for it. Don't be fooled. If you don't know, vote "No."

Net profits do not equal price gouging

To the Editor:

On a recent interview, Vice President Kamala Harris accused the food industry of price gouging and proposed government price controls to curb the alleged abuse as a cause of the increases in prices due to over 20% inflation in the past few years. She provided no evidence for her claim and was not asked to provide support.

The major supermarket food chains traditionally have operated on a very small net profit, usually in the 2% range, relying on volume sales to continue in operations. As an example, the reported net income (published net earnings reported one may find on the internet) of Albertson, Kroger, and Walmart for the 2023 year of operations (selected at random) were 1.43%, 2.244%, and 2.13% respectively.

No informed and reasonable person would consider the net profits gouging!

Instead of recognizing that the Biden-Harris energy policies and deficit spending were the primary reasons for the rise in food and other prices they scapegoat the problem to others!

While the club has continued this tradition for the last 52 years, it has grown to now include all 20th century American glass companies and items such as American pottery companies, some well-known ones are Roseville, McCoy, Hall, Shawnee, Spaulding and Haegar, and American China companies such as Blue Ridge, Franciscan, Lenox, Lotus ware, Pickard, Homer Laughlin and Bauer, and vintage kitchen items and accessories.

Serino announces \$2-million investment in EMS

Ahead of the release of the 2025 Executive Budget, Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino announced a historic \$2 million investment in Emergency Medical Services (EMS). Key highlights of the funding include the launch of supplemental ambulance coverage, a public awareness campaign, and initiatives to address the workforce shortage.

"Emergency Medical Services are a vital lifeline for our residents, and this significant investment ensures we can meet the growing needs of our community," said Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino. "This funding will not only improve EMS response times but also reduce pressure on mutual aid services, ensuring each community has the coverage it needs."

In 2025, Dutchess County will partner with municipalities to launch a supplemental ambulance coverage program, contracting with commercial providers to enhance EMS response and reliability. This will serve as a temporary measure while long-term solutions to the EMS challenges are developed. It will diversify the EMS vendors operating within the county, keeping costs competitive to potentially lower costs for municipalities and improving service reliability. The supplemental coverage will reduce the overuse of mutual aid services, keeping community resources within each community and improving the overall EMS

system for residents.

The \$2 million investment will also support other key efforts, including:

Public Awareness Campaign: To better inform the public about EMS services, the County will create a social media campaign aimed at educating residents on when to call 911 and when other medical options may be more appropriate. The goal is to ensure the public understands the critical and essential role of EMS services in Dutchess County and how they can best utilize them.

Workforce Development: Dutchess County is actively working on recruitment efforts to address the workforce shortage and draw more job seekers into this crucial field. The County is also working to support those who are currently in the field, implementing first responder resiliency trainings, including a peer-to-peer support network for the mental and emotional well-being of first responders.

Deputy Commissioner of Emergency Response Shawn Castano said, "We are grateful to County Executive Serino for her unwavering commitment to addressing the EMS crisis. She has been resolute in bringing people together to understand the problems each of our communities are facing and working to find solutions. This critical investment in EMS will help us advance solutions to ensure residents have the care they need, when they need it most."

Serino first outlined the County's multi-

prong approach to addressing the EMS crisis in her State of the County Address in March and since then, has taken significant steps to find solutions to those challenges. Over the past few months, together with the Department of Emergency Response, she has met with supervisors and mayors and other representatives from every municipality in Dutchess County to discuss the historical and current challenges facing EMS, reviewing data for their specific regions that is critical to informing strategic solutions. The discussions are ongoing with additional meetings being coordinated, including meetings with fire chiefs.

A bipartisan coalition of municipal leaders also joined Serino in advocating for the passage of the New York State Association of Counties 'Rescue EMS' legislative package. Read the letter here. That advocacy led to the successful passage of legislation that allows the ability for EMS providers to bill for 'treatment in place' and to transport patients to alternative destinations, such as the Dutchess County Stabilization Center, by ambulance. The Governor recently signed this legislation into law, an important step toward expanding EMS care and improving service delivery.

In partnership with the Dutchess County Legislature, Serino also launched a new 'Fly-Car' Grant Program, to provide life-saving equipment to fire departments for

their 'fly car' vehicles in exchange for unified EMS recruitment messaging to be decaled on these highly visible vehicles. All Dutchess County fire departments, ambulance corps and rescue squads were eligible for awards of up to \$20,000 for equipment that would help EMS first responders be as effective as possible on scene. Multiple departments took advantage of this opportunity to submit applications, which are currently being reviewed and award announcements will be forthcoming in the coming weeks.

Serino concluded, "We are making every effort to address this challenge. This historic investment represents a significant milestone in ensuring the safety and well-being of all Dutchess County residents. We are committed to building a more resilient, reliable EMS system that our community can depend on when it matters most."

Serino will present her 2025 Executive Budget in the Dutchess County Legislature Chambers on Tuesday, October 29, at 3 p.m. The County Executive's Budget Address can be viewed live on the County's website, dutchessny.gov/budget2025. Serino will also host a countywide tele-town hall forum at 6:30 p.m. that evening when residents will have the opportunity to participate in a live conversation about the proposed budget, learn key details, ask questions and share feedback.

Jodi Hammell, a stroke survivor, will be a speaker at the Nov. 14 Go Red for Women Luncheon in Poughkeepsie. The luncheon will be held at the Double Tree Hilton, 176 Rinaldi Ave.

Hammell was asked if she heard about these luncheons before she had her stroke. She replied, "Yes. A woman I knew had a heart attack at a young age and had been involved with Go Red. And I'd heard and seen it advertised."

As for the life choices Hammell makes now, that she didn't before her stroke, Hammell said she quit smoking and does not drink.

"Since the stroke, honestly, I had a 'pity

party' and ate a lot of pancakes. I also got stenosis and couldn't exercise the way I wanted to. Now I'm losing the weight I gained. I've lost 22 pounds. I try to eat a healthier, balanced diet. I limit my salt intake. I keep an eye on my cholesterol, and my blood pressure is usually 120/70 or lower. I try to get exercise now," explained Hammell. It was in 2023 that Hammell was at work and suffered a stroke. She received physical therapy and occupational therapy.

so personal and important. Women often put others first, but events like this remind us to focus on our own health. As president of Vassar Brothers Medical Center, a leader in cardiac care in the Hudson Valley, I see firsthand the difference education and awareness can make. This luncheon is an opportunity to bring women together, share life-saving information and empower each other to make heart-healthy choices."

What is the bottom line for women and their health, in Hammell's opinion?

"Don't smoke. There's nothing good about it. I smoked most of my adult life and it took a massive stroke that could have killed me to get me to stop. In January of this year, I set a date to quit and called the New York State Smokers Quitline (1-866-NY-QUIT), and got the patches and gum and quit. We women put a lot of pressure on ourselves to look a

certain way, and as mothers and career women, we put everyone else ahead of ourselves. We don't always take the necessary steps to live a healthy lifestyle because we're so invested in the lives of our significant others, our children and/or our careers. We're always on the run," said Hammell.

She continued: "I try to put myself first. I try to stay out of the funk and try to stay motivated to live a healthy, contented life. Try to put myself first. Try to stay out of the funk; try to stay motivated to live a healthy, contented life. My higher power put his hand up and said, 'you've got to slow down, Jodi. You have a purpose on this earth.' I'm sharing my story so others can prevent it happening to them," said Hammell.






Dick's love of sports kept him busy. He followed the Dodgers and the Mets, enjoyed fishing, playing card games and loved to golf.

St. Nicholas-on-the-Hudson to host annual fair Nov. 2

St. Nicholas-on-the-Hudson in New Hamburg, known as the "church with an open heart," will host their annual fair on Saturday, Nov. 2 from 10 until 3. Join them at 37 Point Street to enjoy homemade Italian food, homemade chili (to go), bake sale, holiday items, creative crafts, gift basket raffles, and games for kids.

The church is an active and welcoming Episcopal parish, which, beyond providing Sunday services, engages with the community in many ways, including hosting AA and other outreach programs. Its building, an historic landmark, came into being in the latter half of the 19th century as a Bible class and, later, a Sunday school held on the corner of Cross and Point Streets by Rev. Henry Yates Satterlee, the second rec-

tor of Zion Episcopal Church in Wappingers Falls. Since 2017 the parish has been under the enthusiastic leadership of Reverend Leigh Hall.

Around 1900, members of the Zion congregation suggested that a chapel, an offshoot of the main church, be built for residents of New Hamburg, and an effort to raise money for construction began. Contributions to the fund increased upon the assassination of President William McKinley in 1901 and the chapel, finished in 1903, ultimately became known as the Zion Memorial Chapel, complete with a plaque indicating the honor to McKinley's memory. It was named to the National Register of Historic Places in 1987, and following a period of growth,

was accepted as an independent parish of the New York Diocese only in 2014.

The Gothic Revival style building, which features a gorgeous view of the Hudson River, has undergone significant construction projects over the years, including the addition of a period-appropriate slate roof in 2011.

Through the years, two retaining walls have been built to shore up the street level yard from the lower churchyard. Last year, St. Nick's began to plan and fund-raise to replace the last iteration of the walls and stairs which had been installed in 1984, and now became a safety hazard. The church made the decision to shoulder an extra expense to replace the walls and stairs with con-


crete and brick, plus appropriate drainage, both for aesthetics, as well as protection for the building foundation.

The project is nearly finished, and the congregation is thrilled to show off the beautifully constructed retaining walls, the stairs, the addition of bluestone pathways, and its improved viewshed of the Hudson River.

The craftspeople who've done the work (Gabby Grace Landscaping and Masonry of Beacon) have brought the property into its second century, helping to guarantee that St. Nick's will be a proud member of the hamlet of New Hamburg and surrounding community for many decades to come.





A little viscosity curiosity for Halloween

Remember learning the basic differences between solids and liquids? They are both states of matter with a specific volume. But solids have a definite shape, whereas liquids adopt the shape of their container. As with so many things, though, there are exceptions. If you consider substances like ketchup, shortening, antifreeze, caulk, and putty, they seem to be liquids. But they do not flow as easily as apple juice.

Viscosity

Viscous liquids resist flow and have greater internal friction. They are thick, like honey or cold maple syrup. Compared to a relatively nonviscous fluid, such as water, highly viscous liquids flow much more slowly.

Viscous substances that may be around your house include molasses, nail polish, whipped cream, latex paint, silicone, and custard. But you also have varying levels of viscosity inside your own body. Fluids such as saliva, lymph, and tears, as well as blood, may all fluctuate in their levels of viscosity.

Blood viscosity

Blood is a liquid with solid components. Its viscosity can be affected by changes in red blood cells and proteins in its plasma. Blood may become less viscous when the heart contracts and during periods exercise. Contrarily, there might be an increase in blood viscosity due to health-related factors, such as smoking, congenital heart disease, and dehydration.

With the upcoming ghoulish festivities, it

is the perfect time to make some Halloween Blood. You can make different viscosities depending on your application. Will you put the "blood" on the cloth of a costume or applied to someone's skin? Are you staging a scene of the crime where there is a "bloody" handprint a vertical surface? Do you want the "blood" to drip or stay in one place? Now is the time to satisfy your curiosity about blood viscosity!

Make realistic & tasty Halloween Blood!

Color and viscosity are the main characteristics that will determine if your "blood" looks like the real thing. Blood traveling from the arteries carries more oxygen and looks bright red, whereas venous blood is a darker red color because it had less oxygen content. In addition to being darker, coagulating blood is more gel-like.

There are many recipes to be found for making fake blood. Experiment to find the combination that works for your situation. Red liquid food coloring and water are the most obvious ingredients for Halloween Blood. The addition of a little blue will add some visual authenticity. Vary the amount of blue according to how deoxygenated you want the "blood" to look. If you want to create a "dried wound" effect, mix in coffee grounds. Thicken your "blood" with flour, psyllium, or cornstarch. And if you will be hosting some vampires or other bloodsuckers this holiday, make the blood delicious by incorporating a combination of corn syrup, pancake or maple syrup, honey, ketchup, or chocolate syrup. Yum!
