East Fishkill Supervisor Nicholas D'Alessandro said, "We did whatever we could do to keep the dome [project] going." Since that project did not work out, several companies have had expressed interest in the location off Route 52 in the town. One of those companies is interested in putting a 500,000 square foot logistics center there.

According to D'Alessandro, one company has met with the Dutchess IDA (Industrial Development Agency) and is looking to make a \$100-million investment. The possible new tenant is also looking for a tax PILOT (Payment in Lieu of Taxes). There would be a guarantee for a certain number of jobs, said D'Alessandro, but that specific number has not been worked out as of this time.

"Depending on the end user, depends on the number of jobs," stated D'Alessandro.

"This will complete the West Campus

development," added the supervisor. The location was previously known as the West Campus and owned by IBM.

D'Alessandro stated that "even with the PILOT, it will be 10 times in taxes instead of when it was fallow."

"It is a win-win, especially with the climate of insecurity with the financial markets," he noted. The supervisor mentioned the Town has to compete with

Don Cady, Sr.: Community service with a big smile

Donald Cady, Sr. will always be remembered as the "Unofficial Mayor of Pleasant Valley." He passed away on Sunday, July 31 at the age of 88.

Born on July 8, 1934, Don was the heir to a generations-long tradition of Cadys serving not just Pleasant Valley and Salt Point, but the entire county, and, when called upon, serving their country as well. He took great pride in the fact that his own children have continued this great tradition this great tradition.

Apparently in a hurry to join the community, he was actually born en-route to Vassar Brothers Hospital. Don Cady was proud to have lived in Pleasant Valley his entire life. He attended Arlington schools leaving the high school in entire life. He attended Arlington schools, leaving the high school in 1952 to join the U.S. Navy. He had to present signed permission from his Mom to leave school at the age of 17. He served 3.5 years as a catapultist on the USS Siboney (CVE112) an escort carrier. He was honorably discharged in 1955.

Pleasant Valley Fire Commissioner Bill Geerlings, in his tribute on the Fire District website, referred to Don Cady as "Mr. Pleasant Valley." Don was available to assist in so many parts of the community.

Geerlings said, "Don was a member of the Pleasant Valley Volunteer Fire District for the last 70 years, where he was Lieutenant, Vice President, President and Commissioner. He was also president of the Dutchess County Association of Fire Districts. He was twice awarded 'Fireman of the Year' and won the Presidents Award from the Salt Point Fire Company in 2001. He was also the Grand Marshall of the Pleasant Valley Weekend Parade in 2016 along with Marty Mills and Fred Albrecht, and in June of 2022 was Grand Marshall along with Marty Mills again for the 75th Marty Mills again for the Anniversary Parade for the Salt Point Fire Company.

Don, who loved to interact with people, both friends and absolute strangers, was one of the first Walkway Over the Hudson ambassadors and spent countless hours there enjoying the beauties of the river and welcoming visitors.

Blessed with a delightful sense of humor, Don often found an outlet for it on the Walkway. One day, while acting as an ambassador, he was accosted by an angry bicyclist complaining about the crowds of pedestrians and how little respect they had for bicycles and "wasn't there a way to keep the walkers away from where the bikes were going?" After some minutes Don heard a freight train approaching from the north. He turned the complainer and said "Excuse me just a minute. I'm a Walkway ambassador and I've got some responsibilities - one is that I've got to get to the other end of the bridge to count the length of that freight train and then put that in the records of the day. Stay here, I'll be back in 15 minutes or so."

With that, he headed in the direction of the

train. Don reported that by the time he'd gone 40 yards, the irate bicyclist had departed in the other direction. "Boy," he said, "I was sure glad to get rid of him."

Managing unhappy visitors didn't happen often, but Don's personality was up to it, and he could have a laugh later telling the story. More serious events, where he may have saved a life, he didn't talk about as much.

There was a day when he came upon a distraught woman beginning to climb onto the railing to jump. Don, in likely his best understanding grandfather sort of style, talked her down and kept her occupied and looking away from the direction where help was coming. When help arrived, she was gently escorted from the bridge. Her last words that day to Don were a heartfelt "Thank you."

People mattered to Don Cady.

Don's wake on Friday, Aug. 5, was crowded for hours. Stories flowed from every corner. There were memories of fires fought, of him playing Santa Claus on the Walkway each year, and of just sitting with him over the years and sharing stories. Nearly the entire community could claim him as their friend, and everyone present that afternoon had their own tale to tell.

In 1961, Don married the love of his life, Pamela Williams. Together they raised a family, ran a business (G.E. Masten Feed Store), and showed the world what service to the community means.

Don's contributions were not lost on the political and civic leadership of the county. He was much appreciated.

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro commented, "Don Cady Sr. was an example of service. A dedicated U.S. Navy Korean War veteran and 60+ year member of the Pleasant Valley Fire Department, he was the embodiment of community and national service. We're blessed to have known him, and his life's work has made our community a better place. We share our deepest condolences with his loved ones, friends, and all who had the privilege to meet him. His legacy will have a lasting impact on Dutchess County and its residents."

New York State Senator Sue Serino, a long time and dear friend to Don,

summed up her feelings and those of much of the community. "This is truly a heartbreaking loss for our community," she said. "A Navy veteran and a dedicated member of the Pleasant Valley Fire Department, Don always had a heartfelt commitment to service, always going above and beyond for Pleasant Valley and the entire community. I'll always remember him with a big smile on his face, greeting us at the Walkway Over the Hudson where he served as an ambassador. His family business, Masten Feeds, has long been a local institution and we will be forever grateful for all he has invested in the local area. He will be deeply missed and our hearts remain with his family during this difficult time."

Don Cady was buried on Saturday, Aug. 6, at Friends Upton Lake Cemetery, 2565 Salt Point Turnpike, Clinton Corners, with a graveside service led by local fire companies.

Connecticut and Pennsylvania, so one has to incentive the businesses to choose East Fishkill.

"This helps to stabilize our tax base. It brings in more jobs, more tax dollars," he said.

Amazon is looking to open its new facility in March 2023, noted the supervisor.

"The building is complete," said D'Alessandro.

"Amazon has been very good to work with. They keep in communication," commented D'Alessandro.

Amazon helped with part of the Route 52 mitigation plan, and construction on the roundabout has been able to begin. Amazon paid more than \$2-million for

the project, said D'Alessandro.

Frito-Lay "just started construction and is slated to open in 2024," said D'Alessandro. This will be another logistics center.

"It is also, very proactive for the community," he said.

The East Fishkill Town Board announced the application for the 150,000 square-foot Fulfillment Center by Rolling Frito-Lay Sales, LP, which is a subsidiary of PepsiCo, in August 2021. The facility will be a part of iPark 84 mixed-use area. It was stated at the time the facility is "part of the Town Board's economic development plans and strategic zoning changes from the past several years, which were made to secure projects of this caliber."

Quiet Cove plaques honor frontline heroes, Saland



Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro—joined by local officials, COVID-19 frontline responders, and park enthusiasts—hosted a celebration event on Aug. 4 to highlight the recently completed improvements at Quiet Cove Riverfront Park in the Town of Poughkeepsie, including the new entrance, access loop and expanded parking areas.

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro—joined by local officials, COVID-19 frontline responders, and park enthusiasts-hosted a celebration event on Aug. 4 to highlight the recently completed improvements at Quiet Cove Riverfront Park in the Town of Poughkeepsie, including the new entrance, access loop and expanded parking areas. The event featured a display of historic photos and a guided walk showcasing the Park's historical past, as well as a special dedication ceremony, including honoring the many local frontline heroes of the COVID-19 pandemic and former New York State Senator Stephen M. Saland.

Molinaro said, "Quiet Cove has long been a favorite spot for picnics, hikes or taking in some spectacular views for residents and tourists alike. Its peaceful setting and proximity to the many other attractions in the area make it an ideal and idyllic park. As the surrounding area continues to see growth and development, these improvements to the entrance, access loop and parking areas are essential to making it even easier for people to come and explore all this great park has

The much-needed improvements began in late 2021 and were completed this spring. Project work included a new combined entrance and exit to align with the adjacent Hudson Heritage development project and allow for improved vehicle and pedestrian access from Route 9. Additionally, the park's access loop and parking areas were expanded to incorporate ADA improvements, a bicycle lane, and almost triple parking capacity.

The new entry area features a bus shelter and park benches as part of a paved plaza, the highlight of which is a sculpture of American flags that was donated by retired Dutchess County Deputy Fire Coordinator and 40-plus-year volunteer and business leader D. Sandy Williams of Rhinebeck. During today's ceremony, the sculpture was dedicated to the frontline heroes of the COVID-19 pandemic. Since March 2020, when the pandemic first reached Dutchess County, countless individuals from all walks of life answered the call to help serve the community on the front line of response and recovery efforts, from hospital and health care facility staff to essential workers and community volunteers. Among those frontline heroes who assisted in the County's COVID-19 response are the more than 500 volunteers of the Medical

Reserve Corps of Dutchess County who contributed more than 40,000 hours, staffed over 150 vaccination clinics and assisted the County's Department of Behavioral & Community Health (DBCH) with tasks such as contact tracing and case investigation, community outreach, delivering groceries to those in isolation, assembling thousands of items of personal protective equipment (PPE) for distribution and more.

Molinaro said, "Over the past two years, the 'front line' of the COVID-19 pandemic has taken many forms. Hospitals and healthcare facilities, essential businesses and community organizations, and our own Medical Reserve Corps of Dutchess County volunteers and **Dutchess County Government employees** each stepped up to serve our residents through unprecedented and uncertain times, ensuring the health, well-being and safety of their neighbors. We are grateful to Sandy Williams and his family for their generous donation and are confident this sculpture will serve as an enduring reminder of the selflessness and dedication of our community heroes.'

Additionally, the park was dedicated in honor of the many years of service to the state and county of former State Senator, Hon. Stephen M. Saland. Sen. Saland began his elected public service as a Councilman in the Town of Wappinger. In 1980, he was elected to the State Assembly and in 1990, was elected to represent the 41st district in the New York State Senate, where he served until 2012. During his 14 years of service in that body, Sen. Saland authored over 300 laws covering a wide range of topics, including criminal justice and victims' rights, domestic violence and child abuse prevention, protecting the rights of those with autism or other disabilities, economic development, environmental protection and cyberbullying prevention. Sen. Saland was also instrumental in the formation of the Hudson River Greenway, protecting open space along the river

Molinaro said, "Sen. Saland knew the importance of county and state governments working together to best serve our residents. Quiet Cove is an excellent example of how successful these partnerships can be. State land once used by the former Hudson River State Hospital, the park is now one of our great Dutchess County parks and enjoyed by residents and visitors alike. We are grateful to Sen. Saland for his dedication to our community and for the lasting partnerships he

forged, and we are proud to dedicate Quiet Cove Riverfront Park in his honor.


Quiet Cove Riverfront Park is a 27acre park along the Hudson River, located just north of Marist College along Route 9 in the Town of Poughkeepsie. The property was included in parcels of land sold in 1867 by William H. Davies and James Roosevelt to the State of New York to build the Hudson River Psychiatric Center and was developed into a water filtration and sewage treatment facility for the adjacent hospital campus. The site also housed a former U.S. Naval Academy boathouse and crew quarters, the latter of which still stands today, and was an active site for collegiate rowing from 1891-1949. In 2005, former Dutchess County Executive William R. Steinhaus negotiated a cooperative partnership with New York State to maintain and operate the park under a 99-year lease. Today, approximately 40,000 individuals visit Quiet Cove annually to take advantage of the park's amenities, including picnic areas and hiking trails, two observation decks and an accessible kayak launch, and the historic boathouse, which is

said, "Quiet Cove serves thousands of residents and visitors per year. During the COVID-19 pandemic, residents looked to our parks as a place to stay safe while finding connection enjoying the incredible scenic views of the Hudson River, having a picnic or taking a paddle on the Cove's unique history and celebrate the contributions of our frontline heroes and

Following the ceremony, event attendees had the opportunity to participate in a guided walk around the waterfront area of the park, led by Lynn Rightmyer from the Hudson River State Hospital Nurses Association, who shared anecdotes about the park's history. The Association, as well as staff from Marist's Archives and Special Collections Department, also provided numerous historic photographs and articles for the event.

Council members, legislator respond to comments from Supervisor Thurston

To the Editor:

While the country may have fiscal demands, the Town of Wappinger is in an excellent financial position. We agree with the Supervisor's statement that, "We must move forward with a commitment to continue implementing the many visions set forth in our Comprehensive Plan." However, we've outlined the following reasons for rejecting the town wide rezoning of the Shopping Center Zone.

BJ's Plaza is owned by a company that is requiring a change in our town law for approving large-scale, high-density apartments with an open-ended plan for the remaining parcels. In essence, a "blank check" to develop however they wish that could affect other shopping centers. Our existing code is broad and does not hinder potential development. Attempted additions to the code were manufacturing and storage in addition to the high-density apartments. They requested 144 apartments that were just a start for the potential development of that site with no other concrete plans that we were told of and would not be provided that information. A 'blank check' or a plan without a valid site plan or architectural drawing for one applicant to change the town-wide shopping center zone, allowing for "Large Scale Mixed Use" or large-scale high-density apartments, is not in the best interest of our residents.

Our action was not indecisive or with inaction. Our decisiveness was based on the fact that our priority is for the people that live here. The applicant can still solicit business for the vacant stores to fill that parcel that they acquired on foreclosure. Our code

does not prohibit the development of the parcel as they presented it. No use was eliminated. We were concerned about the manufacturing, warehousing, and large-scale apartments. We felt that this was not in line with our vision of the described verbatim in the comprehensive plan preserving the qualities that make our community attractive and maintaining a rural character to be protected and enhanced.

Sweeping code changes are detrimental as it affects multiple properties in our town, our quality of life and our traffic. Changing town law is not a benign event. Other shopping centers at DeGarmo Hill and Hannaford would also be open for high-density apartments. Furthermore, changing town code doesn't stop other parcels to apply for shopping center status to build more high-density apartments. Adding more apartments to the town's large supply only benefit the developers and not the existing residents.

He points out that enrollment is down in the schools for the first time. The implication is that commercial and apartments are better for our taxes. More students in the district will add to school taxes as apartments are classified as commercial. Subsequently, more commercial, such as apartments, has only a benefit to the commercial tax base which is insignificant.

Many other arguments or sound bites appear plausible but quickly dissolve on analysis. Our code is broad and inclusive and is no way antiquated. We were elected to serve at the interests of our residents, not the developers.

State Police announce arrest in death of Florida woman

According to State Police, at approximately 2:10 p.m., Troopers and the Bureau of Criminal Investigation were dispatched to a residence on Dorothy Heights in Wappingers Falls for an unresponsive female in a vehicle. According to law enforcement, the woman was identified as Victoria Barnes, 43, of Sebastian, FL, She was discovered deceased by responding emergency medical personnel and New York State Police personnel, it was stated.

According to State Police, investigation led to the arrest of David Osterhoudt, 56, also of Sebastian FL, for Manslaughter in the 2nd Degree, a class

C felony. State Police stated that Osterhoudt was arraigned before the town of Wappinger Court and subsequently remanded to the Dutchess County Jail in lieu of \$250,000 bail, \$750,00 bond or \$1.5 million partially secured bond.

State police investigating fatal crash that killed 85-year-old Wappinger woman

The Dutchess County Sheriff's Office is investigating a three-car fatal crash which occurred on State Route 9D in the Town of Wappinger at approximately 10 a.m. on Aug. 4.

According to law enforcement, the preliminary investigation has revealed that vehicle one operated by Katherine E. Woisin, of Wappinger, was pulling out onto Route 9D from Alpine Drive when it was struck by vehicle two, which was southbound on Route 9D. Vehicle one was then struck a second time by a northbound vehicle which was attempting to avoid the first crash, according to State Police. Woisin, 85, suffered life-threatening injuries and was pronounced dead at the scene, said law enforcement in a press release. State Route 9D was closed for approximately four hours during the investigation, it was stated.

The investigation, according to law enforcement, is continuing by members of the Sheriff's Office's Detective Bureau and Crash Investigation Units, and at this time the primary factor appears to be failure to yield the right of way on the part of Woisin. At this time no charges have been filed and the Sheriff's Office was assisted at the scene by the Dutchess County Medical Examiner, New York State Police, New Department York State Transportation (DOT), and Hughsonville Fire Department.

Notes from the Town of Wappinger Supervisor Additional environmental protection and conservation efforts

Greetings Residents. I hope that you are doing as well as can be during the ongoing 2022 summer of oppressive heat and humidity.

In my ongoing discussions in this column, I have noted our need for additional environmental protection and conservation efforts. During this Fall, I will be introduc-

ing more legislation on these matters.

Concerning our United Wappinger
Water District (UWWD), thank to our customers for your significant water conservation measures this summer. Last week, our average daily water usage rate increased approximately 35%, with a peak day of 70%. Thirty-five percent represents a 350,000 gallons per day increase. Typical average daily flow for the entire year is one million gallons per day. In the past, during comparable droughts, we often well-exceeded 2,000,000 mg a day.

Our Town's three wellfields (Atlas, Hilltop, and Meadowwood) are pumping at normal rates. Because I and the Town Board invested wisely in well-field upgrades (preparing for droughts, growth, and other contingencies), we do not have any current Municipal water supply issues. Nevertheless, everyone should continue to observe normal conservation practices, including:

a. Water in the evening/early morning hours for maximum benefit and mitigation of evaporation and plant burn-out;

b. Ensure that your watering hits the desired plant/grass areas only, not the

walkways, driveways, roads, etc.;
c. Repair leaky pools, faucets and hoses, and do not leave on outdoor spigots during nonuse (hoses can explode under the boiling sun);

d. Where physically possible, use brooms to clean walks and driveway, not a garden hose; and

e. Review your water bills to determine any unexpected increases that could indi-

cate an underground leak.

While we do not have municipal water issues, the ½ of our Town residents, who depend on private well-water, are facing much more dire circumstances. Before this summer drought, many private wells were already failing at increased rates. Part of the problem is that many wells are too shallow (i.e., less than 100' in depth), which are increasingly going dry as surface potable water supplies worsen, even under more normal conditions. Other under more normal conditions. Other issues relate to contamination caused by a number of issues, including: aged septic systems leaching into nearby shallow wells creating high bacteria content of different natures; natural minerals such as natural forming chlorides leaching into the water and other minerals including

iron, calcium, copper and manganese; roadway salt from winter highway clearing; as well as organic and inorganic chemicals that pose serious health risks. This summer drought has worsened these conditions for many residents.

Unfortunately, when the Town had the exceptional opportunity during the 1980s fully to build out our municipal water and sewer systems with nearly full subsidization, the Town's leaders failed to do so. Furthermore, a decade later, the Town voted down our equity participation in Tri-municipal forcing us to become a tenant at higher costs and without any legal say in the operations of the facilities. These issues continue to haunt us. In an effort to address many of the challenges caused by these failures, I have begun a number of initiatives, including the following inter-municipal projects conceived to address BOTH Town and private issues:

a. Village of Wappingers Falls – Implementation of the recently released 9E Plan for the revitalization of the Wappinger Creek/Lake. Also, Emergency Water interconnection with the Village once the Village comes up with the necessary money.

b. Fishkill – Municipal water and sewer extension south on Route 9 and laterally out, especially to the residents in and around Fleetwood. Also, we are exploring water extension for our neighborhoods in the proximity of Chelsea Road. c. East Fishkill – The NY State DEC is the

decommission the Mid-Point Park sewer plant. We are working with East Fishkill to construct a new sewer line from the current plant to Hopewell Junction.

d. East Fishkill/Fishkill and other municipalities. We are beginning an initiative to study and fund dredging, preserving and protecting the Sprout Creek.

In my next column, I will discuss these and other projects in more detail.

Among the many cliches in sports is this one you can't tell the players without a scorecard. There's not a lot of diehards left to like to

There's not a lot of diehards left to like to take that short little pencil and score a baseball game as part of the overall experience. But even if that doesn't interest you, you should still probably pick up a scorecard when you enter Dutchess Stadium to watch the Hudson Valley Renegades these days.

Or any other minor league baseball team, for that matter.

The undeniable truth of the minors is that you truly can't tell the players without a scorecard, simply for the fact that minor league baseball is transient. Its entire structure is based on moving up – and, unfortunately, sometimes down and eventually out – of the system.

"It's always an interesting dynamic," Renegades president and general manager Steve Gliner said. "I think most sports fans want to bond with players, or they have a rooting interest, or they attach themselves to somebody, and in the minors that's hard. Especially now."

"Now," for the purposes of definition at this

particular moment, is in the wake of the Major League Baseball trading deadline. The deadline was last Tuesday, August 2. As if the Hudson Valley roster wasn't already evolving throughout the year with players coming up from Low Class A Tampa to High Class A Hudson Valley, or moving up from the Renegades to Double-A Somerset, N.J., many minor league prospects end up as part of the big league trades.

When the Yankees traded for Kansas City Royals outfielder Andrew Benintendi, two familiar Renegades names ere part of the deal – right-handed pitcher Beck Way and left-hander T.J. Sikkema.

Even former Renegades who endeared themselves to Hudson Valley fans, who had hoped to see them in pinstripes one day, were not immune. Pitcher Ken Waldichuk, who played for the Renegades last year and reached Triple A with the Yankees this year as a highly regarded left-handed pitcher, was part of the trade to the Oakland Athletics that brought fellow hurler Frankie Montaz to New York.

GLINER'S KORNER!

A career in minor league baseball and handling all of the challenges

Every week, Hudson Valley Renegades President Steve Gliner sits down with reporter Rich Thomaselli to discuss the team in particular, and minor league baseball in general.

So I thought this week we would play "This Is Your Life," Steve Gliner!

Is there any music to go with it like on the show? (laughs)

I should have downloaded some for the occasion. My bad. But I thought it would be interesting for people to know how you settled on baseball as a career.

It's funny, but I really didn't have a plan to work in baseball. It kind of just happened. I was in college and I transferred from Buffalo to Albany. I saw in Yankees Magazine that the Yankees had a farm team there (the Albany-Colonie Yankees) and I thought it was kind of cool they had their Double-A team right there. I had no direction, but I went to check it out. That was on a Friday in January of 1988. I only had one class on Fridays and it ended at 10:30 in the morning. I went over to their offices and they said they didn't have anything for me. But I went back. I went back every Friday, showing up at the same time, 11 a.m., every Friday, for seven weeks in a row. Finally they said they would find something for me. After working just two weeks, I was intrigued and I knew this is what I wanted to do.

But you weren't there long.

No, December of 1989, in fact, I hooked up with Marv (noted minor league baseball own and limited partner fork fankees, Goldklang). Marv owned the Charleston (S.C.) RiverDogs and it was a very interesting time down there. Charleston was just coming off of Hurricane Hugo and it was devastating. The ballpark itself was a mess. It needed to be practically rebuilt. And if I remember right, there was a small labor issue in Major League Baseball that delayed the 1990 slightly, so we became a national story - both for recovering from the hurricane and because we became the first professional baseball team, by like five minutes, to start playing baseball again. The community was great in helping us and the ballpark to return, and I feel like we helped the community with the rebuilding process. I was there for four years and I became the Assistant General Manager, running food and beverage marketing, even cleaning the ballpark.

Marvin also owned the Erie Sailors

in the New York-Penn League, but you never actually set foot in Erie, because that's the franchise that eventually was relocated and became the Hudson Valley Renegades.

Yeah, I was happy to make that move, too, because I felt like this was an opportunity to help building something from day one.

And that was a lot of fun, and here we are all these years later - still here and a great success. That winter of 1993 after announcing the move and into 1994 trying to get the Stadium passed by the County Legislature, man, what a time. We just worked so hard to meet that timeline from April 8 (when the Legislature passed the bond) to June 18 (opening day) and get that stadium built. So it's good to have that history behind me with the club. That was especially important when Skip (Weisman) stepped aside and I became general manager in 1999. I'm thankful that I had somebody like him to lean on. I mean, even if he wasn't still living in the area I would have still called him every single day.

What did you learn in your first time around as the GM of the Renegades?

I learned that fist year that I took a good path early in my career by learning, and doing, every job within the team and the ballpark. There are people in my (current) role who take a fast path, but I found having 10 years experience and having done all the roles that I did really prepared me for this. I really understand how it all comes together by having learned it and immersed myself in it when I was younger.

You left the Renegades to go to another Marvin Goldklang team in Fort Myers, Florida. Was that at your request or Marv's?

It was a fortuitous set of circumstances, actually. I am sure that at some point, even just in passing, I had said to Marv that at some point in my career I would like to get closer to my parents and (Steve's wife) Michelle's parents. Oddly enough, the general manager at the time in Fort Myers was from New Jersey and was looking to get back to the Northeast. It worked out and it happened really quick. I was down there in April of 2003 and we basically swapped roles.

You were there for 13-14 years. What did you feel like you learned in Fort Myers especially because it was more than just a minor league baseball team, it was, and is, the home of the Minnesota Twins spring training?



Well, it made me appreciate the short New York-Penn League season a little more, I can tell you that (laughs). I mean I basically doubled my number of games. I don't think that even people who work in the business realize how difficult it is to have a full-season minor league team and be a spring training site for the big league club. Our season really started after the previous season ended. There was no down time. There were (Major League) players who worked out at the facility throughout the off-season. I didn't manage them – the Twins did – but we made sure everything was in place. My main goal was to get everything ready for spring training the minute the (previous) Florida State League (minor league) season ended.

And now you're back in the Hudson Valley, since 2017 in fact. Was it like slipping back into an old comfortable chair?

I'm never comfortable (laughs). We love it here, we're comfortable from that aspect, and our boys are all grown now, but you don't get comfortable in this business. We're always continuing to look to get better and stay ahead of the curve. We're always looking to do whatever it takes - and I encourage our staff to always think outside of the box - to generate interest in our club and our ballpark. Right now, it's an exciting time. We lost an entire season to the pandemic and part of one last year. Only now are we, and most of minor league baseball, getting our momentum back. And it's been great. But you can't sit back on cruise control.

Two dairy farmers who are original committee members – and still going strong - are Harry Baldwin and current President Stephen Van Tassell. They are also veteran volunteers at the milk-shake booth.

So, what makes the milkshakes so good? Baldwin shared a little information. "No. 1, the ice cream is the highest available mix. Ice creams have a wide range of quality mixes - translation how much water. No. 2, each shake has an incredible amount of ice cream - leaving not much room for milk." Then they add the syrup – vanilla, chocolate or strawberry.

And, let's not forget the "local" part. The ice cream is produced by Byrne Dairy and is handled by Sinon Ice Cream of Poughkeepsie and milk is provided by Hudson Valley Fresh from Hudson Valley farms.

Dutchess County," said Baldwin. "That first year we served them in a tent out back of the current 4-H building. Possibly the next year, it moved into the north end of the 4-H Snack Bar. In those early years, dairy farmers and family members manned the booth."



County's participation in Civil War illustrated on Poughkeepsie monument

At Reservoir Square in Poughkeepsie (where South Clinton and Cannon Street meet), stands a monument that pays tribute to the men who fought in the 128th New York Regiment during the Civil War. The monument is imposing and distinctive to the landscape of the city, and commemorates the battles that were fought by that unit during the war, specifically in Louisiana 1863 and 1864 and the Shenandoah Valley in 1864. Of the four sides of the monument itself, one side is dedicated each to six battles in those regions.

In the case of the Shenandoah Valley, the monument raises some very interesting questions for consideration. The two months of campaigning in the Valley, from August to October, 1864, produced some of the most politically significant actions of the war during that year, particularly the Battle of Cedar Creek, the Federal victory taken from the jaws of defeat on 18 October, 1864. The 128th played a prominent role in that battle, and Cedar Creek is the final battle listed on its monument.

But the 128th was not the only Regiment with ties to Dutchess County that fought in that campaign. In fact, there were four regiments that fought in the Valley with Dutchess County connections, with three very different histories prior to Summer 1864. The 128th

is understandably commonly perceived as the primary Dutchess County regiment in the Valley, with 6 of its 10 companies recruited in Dutchess County communities. But another regiment, the 159th New York, was established at the same time in 1862, served in the same Federal XIX Corps for the

vast majority of the war, and fought alongside the 128th on many battle-fields. The 159th, though, is far less well-known.

Part of the challenge is that, despite its unofficial nickname as the "Second Columbia and Dutchess Regiment," the majority of soldiers in this unit were from Brooklyn; five companies were from the Hudson Valley counties while five hailed from the city. It is also interesting that there is no record of a Columbia and Dutchess "First" Regiment; the 128th's nickname, infrequently cited or used, was "Old Steady." But the 159th fought alongside the 128th in all of the major battles and actions in the Shenandoah, suffering comparable casualties and fortunes.

Additionally, two other units with ties to Poughkeepsie fought in the Shenandoah. The 6th New York Cavalry fought throughout the war in the Eastern Theater, and was heavily involved in most major campaigns. The regiment as a whole was recruited from throughout the states, but two troops were from Dutchess County: F Troop from Poughkeepsie and H Troop from Dover. In the Shenandoah, this Regiment, along with the Federal Cavalry as a whole, performed quite well, and the 6th played a prominent role in the victory at Tom's Brook, and also, at the Third Battle of Winchester, participated in the largest cavalry charge of the Civil War.

The final Federal Regiment with Dutchess ties was the 5th New York Heavy Artillery. Heavy Artillery Regiments were organized as static defensive units, with troop manning authorizations normally twice that of a


Civil War presentation set Aug. 18 on Zoom

On Thursday, Aug. 18, at 7 p.m., the Dutchess County Historical Society will host a presentation on Zoom by Dr. Michael Boden, Associate Professor of History at Dutchess Community College. It will examine the experiences of each of the units throughout the Shenandoah Campaign, and seeks to shed some light on the experiences of the men who fought there.

regular Infantry Regiment. At the start of the 1864 campaigning season, as Federal manpower issues were beginning to strain Northern resources, many of these "Heavies" were converted to infantry and sent to armies in the field, primarily in the East. The 5th New York Heavy Artillery was no exception, and after spending the majority of the first two years of the war alternating between assignments in Harper's Ferry, West Virginia, and Washington, D.C., it was assigned to the Army of West Virginia, later known as the Federal VIII Corps, operating in the Valley.

At Cedar Creek, only four of the 12 companies in the Regiment were present on the battlefield, but two of those, F and K Companies, were comprised of men from Dutchess County. Also, by a curious twist of fate, on the morning of the battle, despite being in different Army Corps, the 5th was aligned alongside the 128th in the early fighting. Unfortunately for both of these units, the morning's combat did not go well; the vast majority of the 5th were taken prisoner by the Confederate attack.

All of these diverse experiences raise a number of questions for those interested in Dutchess County's experience in the Civil War.

Make a 'bucket list' plan!

Options abound – just talk to a travel agent

You likely are familiar with the phrase "Bucket List" or perhaps, have seen the movie of the same name. For those who are not familiar, the definition describes the meaning as "a list of accomplishments or experiences that a person hopes to have during their lifetime before they "kick the bucket"

That's the beauty of travel. While a vaca-

That's the beauty of travel. While a vacation usually lasts for a week, the memories last far beyond. Unfortunately, more people dream about travel instead of actually experiencing it.

There are many reasons why people don't travel. Fortunately, the reasons for not traveling are mostly easy to overcome. We, at Embassy Travel, have found that the most common roadblocks to travel are due to lack of finances, lack of a companion, or fear. 

Our summer trip to Italy...

The 'Italian Dennis the Menace' lets loose on the high seas.

Whenever I write a story, I always check with my father. This way he knows what I'm doing, he can approve or disapprove a story and he gets to have input. Nine times out of 10 he approves the story. This time he asked me to run this particular story again.

When my brothers and I were little, every

three years we would go to our home town in Italy called Monte Di Proscida, to visit my father's mother and his sisters. Why every three years, because my two uncles living here in the States and my father would take turns going to Italy, so that every summer, my grandmother would have one of his sons with her.

Our trips to Italy were always an event. We would pack candy and chocolate to hand out to our cousins and relatives. I can remember my suitcase smelling of Fruit Stripe gum.

I can remember one trip in particular. It was 1972 and my father had decided that he was going to retire to Italy that year, to take care of his mother. I was 4 years old at the time and a very hyper kid and was very excited to start such an adventure. In my mind, I imagined a fantasy land with gladiators and chariots. Since I was only a year old on our prior trip, I didn't remember anything, so this was all new to me.

In June of that year, right after school let out, we packed all our belongings and boarded the SS Michaelangelo in New York City, for a 9-day trip across the Atlantic to Rome. As I said, I was a very rambunctious boy and was a handful for my mother. To complicate matters, my mother was 5 months pregnant with my brother Vinny and couldn't chase me. She was also unhappy, because she wanted to her baby to be born in the States and wanted to postpone the trip till after the birth. So she was uncomfortable and unhappy. So controlling me was left up to my father and since he was also trying to make my mother happy, I became his project.

You know it's funny how as adults, when left with a person of authority, we just do what we are told and usually things are run very quietly and smoothly. You are told what to do, you do it, and everyone is happy. Try doing that with a 4-year-old with more energy than the Energizer Bunny, who runs around like chicken with his hair on fire. Four-year-olds question everything and don't take kindly to being told what they can't do. It was the perfect storm brewing and my father had no idea what was coming.

Needless to say, the boat trip did not fit my personality very well. It was a long and sometimes boring trip. Ships in 1972 were a lot different than ships today. There was no water slide or movie theater. There weren't really any children's estivities. In an effect to really any children's activities. In an effort to keep me busy, my father would drop me at the "evil" day care center every morning. So, knowing my mother's condition, and the fact that my older brothers were sea sick, I was left with just one obstacle for freedom, my

The first day at day care, I was fine. It was new and I really wasn't too bored. However, there were no kids my age. The second day was different. After about an hour, I had to get out of there. I began to plot my escape. The next day, Day 3, my father dropped me off. It was time to make my move. As soon as he rounded the corner, out I went. I was so fast that no one could catch me. I became quite adept at getting free. If you ever saw those old WW2 movies where the prisoners of war would escape, that was me. I would go to the bathroom and never come back. Or I would say I see my father in the window and dart out the door when their guard was down. I have to say that toward the end of the trip, they didn't quite mind when I escaped.

After every escape, my father would run around the ship looking for me. Every day, I would hear my name over the loud speakers in an effort to stop me. I can remember running around the ship darting into closed restaurants and other people's rooms. Riding the elevators up and down. I can also remember being cornered and slipping through their arms when they lunged for me and missed. It was the Italian version of "Home Alone" mixed with "the Great Escape." Every afternoon, I would finally be caught and brought back to the evil day care center where I would persecute my captors. I can still picture those poor room mothers. For some reason, their hair was always messed up and they always looked tired.

Every morning, my father would ask me if I planned on escaping. I would always answer no. He would then ask me to be good. And I would always answer that I would. I can honestly say I remember feeling that I would be good to make my father happy. However, once he left, I couldn't help myself. I had to run.

Every evening, after another long day of escaping and running, we would get dressed up for dinner with a jacket and tie. I have a picture of all of us at a table with the captain. My brothers are all sitting there nicely. I have this wild look in my eyes and I can see that my feet are dangling off the chair and kicking. My father had his arm around me and the captain is looking right at me. I always sat next to my father so he could try to control me. My poor parents. They had no idea what to do with me.

At dinner, Mom would always order the equivalent of the kid's meal for me. It almost

always was a hamburger with fries. I remember one time my father order Filet of Sole Francese. It was one of those father and son moments. I remember him taking a bite then feeding me a bite. Back and forth we went with the whole dinner. He had his arm around me and I was almost sitting on his lap. I remember I was so close to him, I could smell his Old Spice after shave. He had on a black suit, white shirt and a red tie. His hair was thinning but he had a little loop of hair on the top of his head. He had a big smile on his face. Mom had a big smile also as she watched Pop and I share dinner. It was probably the nicest and only nice moment of

our trip across the Atlantic.

The next day, I went back to plotting my next escape and persecuting my captors. When we finally arrived in Rome, everyone knew who Luigi Coppola was and all were happy to see us disembark. So while you laugh at the stories of my memories with my father and as you reminisce about your own, enjoy this recipe of Filet of Sole Francese. Buon Appetito!

Filet of Sole Frances **Ingredients:**

For the Fish: 46-8 ounce filets of Sole or Flounder pinch pepper 4 tablespoons olive oil 1 cup flour for dredging 4 eggs, beaten

For the Lemon Butter Sauce:

1 teaspoon garlic, minced 1 teaspoon shallots, minced 2 lemons, juiced

- 4 6 ounces white wine
- 3 ounces chilled sweet butter in cubes 2 tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped pinch salt
- pinch pepper

Directions:

Season fish fillets with salt and pepper. Heat a large sauté pan with olive oil until hot. Lightly dredge the fish in flour, then the beaten egg. Place in the hot oil. Cook until golden brown and turn.

Add the garlic and shallots to the pan with the fish. Sauté until the shallots are translucent. Add the lemon, white wine and simmer 2 - 3 minutes until sauce reduces slightly. Remove the fish from the pan with a long metal spatula and place on plates. Increase the heat to medium-high. Whisk in the cubes of the chilled butter while simultaneously shaking the pan to incorporate the butter to emulsify the sauce. Do not boil!

Remove from heat. Add the parsley, salt and pepper. Evenly distribute the sauce over the fish. Serve immediately

This most important of festivals for the Oaxacan community is an opportunity to






